- The League is a dance band for people who enjoy social dancing. We are prepared to deliver requests for almost any traditional ballroom style, such as Foxtrot, Waltz, Cha Cha, Rhumba, Tango, Waltz, Samba, Shag, Jitterbug, Triple-Step, East Coast and West Coast Swing, as well as providing energetic rhythms for free form dancing, second-line, or just plain shaking your ass. We don't do the Electric Slide, you do.
- Maybe you don't recognize some of these tunes. We are always on the lookout for tunes that are a good vehicle for our particular instrumentation – front-boy, three horns, rhythm section and a couple of harmony vocals. We have found that early Rhythm and Blues from the late forties and early fifties was often performed with a similar lineup, as was sixties Soul and Funk from the early seventies. That is why we perform tunes from the post big band to the pre digital DJ period. It is great live music for dancing, but not always what was played on mainstream top forty radio stations.
- If you have seen the band perform (and you should before you hire us) you know that we try to keep things danceable and that we are focused on keeping the energy on the dance floor at a stimulating level. Sometimes it is a ballad that will get a crowd on the dance floor and that is an entirely different kind of energy. A large part of being a good dance band is being able to read a crowd and being able to resonate with different generations. We are constantly observing the crowd and their response to what we play so that we can give them something they can relate to.
- We are not the right band for every situation and we don't try to be. If you host an adventurous crowd that appreciates Jump Swing, Memphis Soul, New Orleans Funk, played by a cohesive unit of solid musicians who relish occasional leaps into the unknown, then you could not find a better band than the League of Decency.
